

THE FOLLOWING EXPLANATION OF THE NEW HOMESCHOOL LAW IS TAKEN FROM THE HEAV HOMESCHOOL UPDATE

Curriculum Change Goes into Effect

The new curriculum description law went into effect July 1, 2012. Any parent who complies with §22.1-254.1 by filing a Notice of Intent or writing a letter to the local superintendent, must file a description of curriculum.

In past years, parents had to supply descriptions that included various elements of the superintendent's choosing--detailed course descriptions, outlines, textbook titles, methods of instruction, tables of contents, or scope and sequences. Now the description of curriculum is limited to a list of subjects to be studied during the coming year.

HEAV has notified all district superintendents by letter about the law change. If your superintendent requests additional information from you when you submit your Notice of Intent, please respectfully inform his office that the curriculum description has been clarified and the new law, §22.1-254.1(B), went into effect July 1. If you have supplied additional information in the past, you are no longer required to do so.

ENCOURAGEMENT

Balancing the Beam

Home schooling has been both a journey and a task that I've undertaken for more than 25 years, not only in teaching my own children but in talking to countless others about it, explaining the nuts and bolts of doing it, and recommending the most helpful products.

I say home schooling is both a journey and a task because it encompasses both a vision for a destination and the day-to-day working out of that vision. I've found that those who have the most trouble with home schooling tend to see it as either one or the other.

Some lean towards the "task" side. You've probably seen these mothers. You may even have been one of them. They want to know all about curriculums, teaching materials, schedules, grade levels, academic milestones, organization, and the most effective ways of disciplining children. They are constantly overwhelmed, riding herd on their brood, talking about how hard things are and how unmanageable their children are. They may be frazzled, nagging, and complaining, but, by God, they are going to home school!

Others lean more towards the "journey" side. You've probably seen these mothers too, and often they are just as frazzled as the "task-oriented" mothers, but have reframed their frazzled-ness into a spiritual badge of honor. They see home schooling as something organic and alive, their children as creative beings who should not be restrained, the universe as loving and abundant. They are all about love, and light, and freedom. Their home and family life tends to swing between creative disorder and chaos.

When I think about these two extremes, I'm reminded of C.S. Lewis. Many years ago, Lewis wrote a profound essay called <u>Meditation in a Toolshed</u>. Once, while looking for something in a dark toolshed, his attention was drawn to a single beam of light coming in through an irregular opening at the top of the toolshed door. As he looked at the beam and then came closer so that he was looking along the beam, he saw two very different realities. He says:

I was standing today in the dark toolshed. The sun was shining outside and through the crack at the top of the door there came a sunbeam. From where I stood that beam of light, with the specks of dust floating in it, was the most striking thing in the place. Everything else was almost pitch-black. I was seeing the beam, not seeing things by it.

Then I moved, so that the beam fell on my eyes. Instantly the whole previous picture vanished. I saw no toolshed, and (above all) no beam. Instead I saw, framed in the irregular cranny at the top of the door, green leaves moving on the branches of a tree outside and beyond that, 90 odd million miles away, the sun.

Looking along the beam, and looking at the beam are very different experiences.

Very different experiences indeed. For Lewis, looking *at* the beam and looking *along* the beam were metaphors for two very different ways of perceiving reality. But it also works as a metaphor describing these two very different ways of approaching home schooling: task or journey.

How you look determines what you see

As long as we just look at the beam of light, our vision is confined to the dark toolshed, but when we look "along the beam," we see the bigger picture of which the toolshed is just a small part.

When you look "at" the beam, you are standing "outside" of it. Standing outside the light allows you to objectify it, observe it, analyze it. But the problem is, in order to look "at" the beam, you have to keep the beam a certain distance from yourself.

But when you look "along the beam," the beam becomes no longer an object that you are standing before, observing, able to analyze. You become part of all that the sunbeam illuminates and you can see its source. However, by focusing on "looking along the beam," it is easy to lose sight of the toolshed and the current reality in which you are standing.

You can look at a beam, or you can look along a beam, but can you do both?

Two different experiences of life

Everything in life is like that beam of light. We are either standing outside it, analyzing and evaluating it, or we are "looking along the beam" seeing the real essence of it. And home schooling is no exception.

As C. S. Lewis remarked,

You get one experience of a thing when you look along it and another when you look at it. Which is the "true" or "valid" experience? Which tells you most about the thing?

The answer is: both ways of looking. Yes, a lover can probably tell you more about the subjective experience of love than a psychologist, but the scientist can tell you more about the objective experience from the point of view of the mental, emotional, and physiological effects of falling in love. From the lover's point of view, falling in love is a transcendent experience, while from the scientist's it is just a complex series of biochemical reactions. Which is it? Actually, it's both.

You can look *at* home schooling, you can study it, you can find out all the best ways of doing it, the most effective teaching materials, the most productive philosophy, the best practices, and you can objectify your children to the point that they are like looking *at* the beam. But to do so requires that you put yourself outside of the light that can be found in the journey. Objectifying things and people requires that you keep them "at arm's length." If you're going to do that, home schooling becomes little more than a home-based version of institutional schooling, without all the secular influences. In short, we have limited our vision and experience to the dark toolshed—the practical realities of life.

But you can also look at home schooling as a metaphysical, spiritual experience, a "calling" or "mission" or destiny. You can get so immersed in "looking along the beam" that you lose sight of the day-to-day toolshed aspects of life and get lost in things, like the sun, that are a million miles away. In church, we used to call that "being so heavenly minded that you're no earthly good."

I'll close with another quote from Lewis:

We must, on pain of idiocy, deny from the very outset the idea that looking at is, by its own nature, intrinsically truer or better than looking along. One must look both along and at everything. In particular cases we shall find reason for regarding the one or the other vision as inferior.

In fact, we must take each case on its merits. But we must start with no prejudice for or against either kind of looking. We do not know in advance whether the lover or the psychologist is giving the more correct account of love, or whether both accounts are equally correct in different ways, or whether both are equally wrong. We just have to find out.

Somehow, we have to be able to balance the beam...both look *at* it and look *along* it.

Here's to the ability to balance the beam!
